

This plan is the culmination of extensive consultation, consideration and experience and reflects the Board's determination that it will be meaningful, understandable and clearly focused on the core functions and objectives of Inland Fisheries Ireland as outlined in Section 7 of the 2010 Inland Fisheries Act.

It is also the firm wish of the Board that this plan will be meaningful, useful and helpful to staff, stakeholders and the general public.

In its preparation for the delivery of this plan the Board and Executive invested a lot of time and effort in redefining Inland Fisheries Ireland's values and mission statement. The values and mission statement are the guiding principle and foundation for this document. The Board is confident that this plan is faithful to and aligned with the clearly redefined values. It takes due cognisance of Inland Fisheries Ireland's legislative framework but the real challenge and opportunity for all will be in living the values in the implementation of the plan.

It is envisaged that the core functions of protection, management and conservation of the inland fisheries resource will be delivered, measured and reviewed under the headings of Habitat, Fish, Stakeholders, Sustainability, Our People, Corporate Management and Innovation.

Although this outline is not significantly changed from the last plan, the context and challenges for the resource have changed considerably and the current plan and allocation of resources must reflect the ever changing circumstances.

Wildlife and freshwater species are vanishing at an alarming rate worldwide and Ireland is not unaffected.

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Environmental factors, water quality, urbanisation and global warming are all impacting negatively on the resource. In order to assist the survival and sustainability of fish, Inland Fisheries Ireland will redirect staff and resources to conservation and habitat works. Inland Fisheries Ireland will, of necessity, increase its focus on conservation activities while continuing to deliver targeted and effective protection, development and promotion functions. Circumstances have changed and continue to evolve, consequently Inland Fisheries Ireland's planning and delivery must be proactive.

The concentration on conservation of the resource will resonate with stakeholders and an increasingly environmentally aware populace. It presents an opportunity to renew and positively build our relationship with stakeholders in our joint effort to sustain our shared resource. Inland Fisheries Ireland staff will be our ambassadors in this vital task.

The good performance of the organisation must always be a consideration for the Board. The resilient, resourceful and adaptable staff are key to the success of this plan and the Board and I appreciate the continued commitment and dedication of staff at all levels and are confident that they will rise to the challenges currently prevailing.

Governance comprises the systems and procedures under which organisations are directed and controlled. A robust system of governance enables the organisation to operate effectively and to discharge its responsibilities as regards transparency and accountability to those we serve. Inland Fisheries Ireland is a public sector body and as such we willingly comply with the governance and financial requirements of our parent department, the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC).

Chief Executive Officer's Introduction

I am delighted to present Inland Fisheries Ireland's new five-year Corporate Plan 2021-2025. This plan will help Inland Fisheries Ireland to ground our priorities for the next five years with a strong focus on delivering on our statutory remit.

This plan clearly sets out our vision, mission and values as an organisation. Knowing who we are and what we stand for will form the foundation as to how we will deliver on our high-level objectives and outcomes set out in this plan. Moreover, this will allow us to refocus on the resource we protect, the stakeholders we engage with, and the wider public in general.

Ireland, like the rest of the world, is experiencing the detrimental effects of climate change, the destruction of natural habitats, and the continuing decline of vulnerable species. This is particularly true of the freshwater species that we protect. Many of our larger lake systems that remained unchanged for the last millennia are now in a transition state. Species such as the wonderful Atlantic salmon have now declined across their home range at an alarming rate. Many thought that this could never happen.

We know that many freshwater species have limited toleration to water chemistry changes. This is already evident to Inland Fisheries Ireland and is borne out in our own research and that of others. Invasive species, both flora and fauna are posing immense ecological challenges for freshwater systems and native species across Ireland. We need a collective response to this problem by engaging other agencies and the public in general. Inland Fisheries Ireland will not be found wanting in terms of working with others to find solutions to these issues.

Over 320,000 Irish people love to go fishing and Ireland's inland fisheries attracts 150,000 visiting anglers annually.

Working together with anglers and our tourism partners, Inland Fisheries Ireland will continue to manage and promote sustainable angling to ensure that our precious resource is accessible and sustainable thereby supporting biodiversity, well-being and the economy.

The illegal taking of freshwater fish by unscrupulous individuals remains a high priority for Inland Fisheries Ireland as a conservation agency. I would ask the public to play its part and report where possible such activity. After all, this is your resource and that of your children. No one has the right to exploit this resource illegally for profit or gain. This is a natural asset that belongs to us all and one that is critically important for socioeconomic development in rural areas.

This Corporate Plan will be supported by robust corporate governance practices in line with existing requirements for the public service. Resources will be directed to key areas aligned with our statutory remit to protect fish, to protect water quality and to develop and improve fish habitats. The latter will be underpinned by evidenced based scientific research in line with good practice in an era of climate change.

Our people believe in maintaining freshwater ecosystem integrity for future generations.

Public Sector Context

Inland Fisheries Ireland is a State Agency operating under the Aegis of the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC). The Inland Fisheries Ireland Corporate Plan 2021–2025 has been prepared in such a way that it is congruent with the overall strategic goals of our Parent Department.

In addition to adhering to our Parent Department's Statement of Strategy, Inland Fisheries Ireland's Corporate Plan also recognises a suite of other Government policies, frameworks initiatives including inter alia;

Inland Fisheries Ireland's role in relation to the inland fisheries resource is primarily concerned with the protection, management conservation, development and promotion of freshwater fisheries in Ireland including the fish species listed in the Habitats Directive. In addition, Inland Fisheries Ireland's remit also covers certain activities at sea, including commercial fishing for salmon and sea trout, and recreational sea angling. While the Minister through the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC) has overall policy responsibility for the protection, management and conservation, of the inland fisheries sector, Inland Fisheries Ireland has primary responsibility for the implementation of fisheries policy. Other public bodies such as the Loughs Agency, the Sea Fisheries Protection Authority (SFPA), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Marine Institute (MI) and the Electricity Supply Board (ESB) also play important roles in the sector.

How the plan was developed

Inland Fisheries Ireland has engaged in an inclusive consultation process which began in 2019. This process involved consulting stakeholders within the public sector, sectoral interest groups, members of the general public and staff, on aspects of our previous Corporate Plan (2016-2020) and their aspirations for Ireland's inland fisheries into the future.

Also, during 2019, four core values were devised through workshops with the Board, Senior leadership and Management teams. These core values underpin the fundamental beliefs of the Board Management and Staff of Inland Fisheries Ireland and reflect how we, as a conservation organisation will undertake our daily work and interact with all of Inland Fisheries Ireland's stakeholders.

The Board of Inland Fisheries Ireland approved the newly developed vision, mission and values and set a series of High Level Objectives for its next five year strategy in October of 2019. Following this, a working group made up of a cross section of staff from within Inland Fisheries Ireland created descriptors for each of the four values – a "roadmap" of what these values mean to us in our roles and how they can be lived each day.

In November 2019, Inland Fisheries Ireland staff came together to provide feedback on the previous Corporate Plan and provide their input into the new plan.

During 2020, a national and international sectoral scan was conducted. Incorporating inputs from this scan and consultations, an analysis document was developed, and staff were invited to provide their feedback on this. With this feedback, Inland Fisheries Ireland's Senior Leadership Team developed actions and outcomes which were workshopped with the Board arriving at Inland Fisheries Ireland's strategy for the next five years.

Corporate Plan 2021-2025

Our Corporate Plan details the Inland Fisheries Ireland's, Vision, Mission and Values and our seven strategic objectives for the period 2021 to 2025. Under each of the seven objectives a series of actions required to achieve the objectives are described, with the intended outcomes outlined. The strategic objectives outline where Inland Fisheries Ireland will focus our efforts over the next five years.

Inland Fisheries Ireland will secure stakeholder feedback on the implementation of the Strategy mid-2023.
