CONSERVATION OF SALMON AND SEA TROUT (EXTENSION TO RIVER SUIR SNAP NETS SEASON) BYE-LAW NO. XXX, 2013.

I, Fergus O'Dowd, Minister of State at the Department of Communications, Energy and Natural Resources, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 57 of the Inland Fisheries Act 2010 (No. 10 of 2010) and the Energy and Natural Resources (Delegation of Ministerial Functions) (No. 2) Order 2011 (S.I. No. 631 of 2011), at the request of Inland Fisheries Ireland, and having complied with Regulations 27 and 42 of the European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations 2011 (S.I. No. 477 of 2011), hereby make the following bye-law:

- 1. (1) This Bye-law may be cited as the Conservation of Salmon and Sea Trout (Extension to River Suir Snap Nets Season) Bye-law No. XXX, 2013.
 - (2) This Bye-law comes into operation on 17 June 2013.
- 2. In this Bye-law
 - "River Suir" means the waters of the River Suir including Clodiagh, Lingaun and Blackwater in the No. 3 or Waterford District.
- 3. Notwithstanding Article 4(b) of the Conservation of Salmon and Sea Trout (Draft Nets and Snap Nets) Bye-law No. 906, 2013 or anything contained in any Bye-law fixing the annual close season for salmon or sea trout in any locality, it is permitted, during the period commencing on 17 June 2013 and ending on 14 August 2013, to take or to fish for salmon or sea trout with a snap net in the River Suir.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This is not part of the Bye-law and does not purport to be a legal interpretation).

This Bye-Law sets out an extension to the snap net salmon and sea trout (salmon includes sea trout as defined in the Inland Fisheries Act 2010) commercial fishing season in the River Suir in the No. 3 or Waterford Fishery District.

FOOTNOTE

Section 57 (7) of the Inland Fisheries Act, 2010 provides that any person aggrieved by this Bye-law may, within 28 days after its publication in the Iris Oifigiúil, appeal against same to the High Court.
