Getting to the South West

Roads: The south west can be accessed by way of the M7 & M8 from Dublin, M18 from Galway and the N25 from Rosslare.

Airports: Ireland's main international airports are at Dublin, Cork, Shannon and Belfast. Kerry regional airport also services the south west area.

Ferry Ports: There is a ferry port in Cork and the area is also easily accessed from the ferry ports in Rosslare, Dublin and Dun Laoghaire.

O/S Maps: Anglers may find the Ordnance Survey Discovery Series Map No's 70-73, 78-81 & 83-89 beneficial when visiting the south west. These are available from most newsagents and bookstores.

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to this practical guide to angling in the South West of Ireland. It covers Game, Sea and Coarse angling. We have designed it to address the many questions that anglers invariably have when visiting a new area or country. We hope that this information is helpful and that you have an enjoyable and productive trip to the South West of Ireland.

We are proud of the quality of our angling and environment and while our region has a reputation for being wild, mystical and remote, it also boasts a level of luxury and infrastructure comparable to anywhere in the world.

GETTING DOWN TO BASICS

RULES AND REGULATIONS

This is one area where anglers are often confused, especially on their first visit to a new country or region. Luckily the situation in Ireland is not complex though there are some regional variations that anglers need to be aware of. These are discussed in detail. Please note that there is a plastic pocket at the back of this guide that contains any new angling information.

GAME ANGLING

For ease of use we have broken down the Game Angling section into two districts: CORK and KERRY. While we have listed the larger river systems in some detail there are also many other smaller systems that offer excellent angling. The South West abounds with mountain lakes and these can be truly spectacular offering superb angling for free rising wild Brown Trout.

We also stock Rainbow Trout in a number of lakes throughout the South West on a weekly basis during the angling season. Boats are available for hire at some lakes. These are clearly marked on the relevant maps in this guide. In addition we stock one lake for Winter Trout Fishing in Ballinlough, Leap.

GAME ANGLING INFORMATION

SALMON AND SEA TROUT

Rivers and lakes in the South West open for angling at different times. However you will be able to go Salmon and Sea Trout angling from as early as the 17th of January up to the end of September. Generally the more productive times are as follows:

Season Spring Salmon (multi sea winter salmon)

Grilse (one sea winter salmon)

Sea Trout

March to May.
June to September.
May to September.

STATE ROD LICENCE

When intending to fish for Salmon or Sea Trout you need to purchase a State Rod Licence before you go angling. These are readily available from most tackle shops, IFI Macroom offices and other outlets. In order to accommodate the angler there are a variety of licence options ranging from a national (all districts) full season to a one day district tourist licence. Ireland is divided into a number of fishery districts or areas and therefore, as a rule of thumb, if you are intending to travel around Ireland an 'all districts' licence would be your best bet. Below is the complete list of the State Rod Licence options available.

- · All districts/regions full season.
- · All districts/regions full season juvenile.
- · District, full season.
- · 21 day (tourist). All Districts
- · One day (tourist). All Districts
- · Foyle area extension.

LOGBOOKS AND TAGS

When you purshase your State Rod Licence you will be issued with a log book and one or more Tags depending on the time of year. You are required to tag any Salmon that you kill. Similarly you must tag any Sea Trout over 40cm that you kill. Fill in your log book when you tag your fish.

 Please Note that Game Angling Regulations and Opening and Closing Times of Rivers and Lakes are Subject to change on an annual basis for conservation reasons. Also Note some rivers may remain closed for Salmon Angling for the entire season. See list at back.

The tagging and logbook system is very straightforward however if you have any questions please contact the local IFI Macroom or the outlet where you bought your licence and they will be happy to assist you.

GAME ANGLING INFORMATION

In addition to your State Rod licence you will most likely have to purchase a fishing permit for the waters you intend to fish. Some State waters are permit free such as Lakes of Killarney and Lough Currane though usually most Salmon and Sea Trout waters carry a permit charge. The permit cost starts at around €20 per day with the average being €40.

Please note that the amount charged does not necessarily reflect the quality of the angling that you will experience. Some State waters for instance are very keenly priced so as to accommodate all anglers.

KERRY GAME ANGLING FISHERIES

CLOONEE LAKE SYSTEM - General MAP No.1

This attractive fishery on the South side of Kenmare Bay is approximately 16 Kms from Kenmare in County Kerry and a similar distance from Castletownbere in County Cork. It consists of 4 main lakes with short rivers joining them. The lakes contain large quantities of Brown Trout averaging 200g in weight and also get a small run of Sea Trout and Salmon. Boats are available for hire.

This spate river is one of three rivers that enters the sea at Kenmare, Co Kerry. It gets a fair run of Spring Salmon from March and the run of Grilse arrives in mid June. There is a further run of big Salmon in the late part of the season.

This lovely river drains a catchment area of over 125 square Kms and is approximately 32 Kms long. It gets a nice run of Spring Salmon and a very good run of lively Grilse from mid June to late July. It also gets a reasonable run of Sea Trout. Angling access is good throughout the system and this is a very enjoyable and picturesque river to fish. Two angling organisations manage most of this river and permits are available.

It also has a run of Sea Trout that head up to the beautiful Lough Brin. Access is well developed and the river is run as a model for sustainable development. There are two boats available for hire on Lough Brin.

The upper lakes system is extremely picturesque and a beautiful place to go fishing.

The lake holds a large stock of free rising wild Brown Trout which are great fighters and the occasional Artic Char. The lower fishery is noted for its Sea Trout fishing. Boats are readily available for rent on the lake.

This is a large catchment area of 520 square Kms that offers some superb angling. It gets good runs of Salmon and Grilse throughout the season. Sea Trout fishing is concentrated on the river Laune. The lakes and rivers of this system have very good populations of fair sized Brown Trout that eagerly accept a fly. Large Ferox Brown Trout can be caught on Lough Lein by trolling artificial baits. Access is good throughout and boats and guides are available.

It has excellent catches of 1000 plus Salmon and Grilse every year and similar catches of Sea Trout.

GAME ANGLING METHODS AND TECHNIQUES

SALMON OVERVIEW

How an angler fishes and with what is a personal choice however we have listed some points which may assist you in selecting your tackle and approach. A single handed 8/9 weight fly rod with matching line is ideal for Salmon fishing in the South West. In fact a double-handed fly rod in many cases becomes a little cumbersome though rivers such as the Lee and Bandon in county Cork and the Laune in county Kerry lend themselves to the double-hander. If you are trying to keep your tackle to a minimum settle on an 8/9 weight single handed fly rod. You can purchase flies locally however many anglers enjoy trying their home patterns.

Your leader line should be around 16lbs / 7.3 Kg breaking strain. Regarding wading its always nice to have the option however you can usually access many areas from the bank. On a spate river, as nearly all Kerry rivers and a fair number of the Cork rivers are, the most productive time to fish is as the river level falls after rain and the water starts to clear (fine down). Dawn and dusk should definitely be fished, but you may catch fish during the day. In order to get the fly down, in moving water, a sink-tip fly line is almost essential. A short spinning rod can also be productive and lures can be purchased locally.

GAME ANGLING METHODS AND TECHNIQUES

SUGGESTED SALMON TACKLE

River Fly Fishing

Rod & Reel - This depends primarily on the size of the river.

Large rivers require large powerfull rods that can throw a line across and downstream, these are in the region of 15ft in length with matching Salmon Fly Reels.

Small rivers require a 12ft Reservoir Trout Fly rod or similar but upgrade the line weight to a weight no 7 to 9 if possible and a minimum 6. Casting of the fly should be across and downstream. This may require a line mend (see diagram Page 12) This tackle can also be used effectively when angling for Trout and Sea Trout on rivers and lakes but it is recommended to scale down the breaking strain of line for Trout and increase the number of flies from 1 to 3 or 4.


The leader length should be in the region of 10 to 14 ft and be a minimum breaking strain of 10lbs(5kg). The size of Salmon fly will be dependent on the amount of water flowing in the river and as a rule the bigger the flood the bigger the fly.

Lake Fly Fishing

Rods should not exceed 12ft in length and reels should be loaded with 6 to 8 weight lines. The leader breaking strain should be a minimum of 10lb to 12lb(5Kg). The difference between river and lake leaders is that there can be 1 or 3 droppers tied with a blood loop knot on a lake leader (see diagram on Page 13). Flies will also differ in size for lake fished Salmon and tend to be fairly standard in size from 10 to 6 depending again on water levels. Also take into account factors such as wind and cloud cover.


River Spinning


Rods should be between 10ft and 12ft in length and line strength should be a minimum of 8lb(3.6Kg) and not more than 15lb(7Kg) breaking strain. Many spinning baits are available to the Salmon angler but the angler would be well advised to have a selection of "Flying C's" in various colours and blade sizes in the tackle box. Anglers should adopt a fan casting pattern when targeting River Salmon described in the diagram on Page 13.

Lough Trolling


This essentially is spinning on a lake and requires exactly the same tackle as used on a river. The steady movement of the boat puts action into the lure when it is trolled over traditional fish-holding waters for long periods. This is quite an effective method of catching Salmon.

River Worming


River spinning tackle is ideal for worm fishing and is probably the most effective method of catching Salmon in flood conditions. It involves searching the riverbed for fish with a ledgered rig set up (see diagram Page 15). These rigs can also be used with a float as a bite indicator.

River Shrimping

This is an effective method of catching Salmon in difficult conditions and involves trotting a coloured shrimp underneath a float downstream through a pool. In some circumstances it involves float ledgering the shrimp (Fast Water) and at other times suspending the shrimp a few feet off the riverbed (Slow / Dead Water). At times it can be fished in a similar manner to a Salmon fly but also in a Sink and Draw pattern as explained in the diagram below.

INTRODUCTION

BROWN TROUT

You can fish for Brown Trout throughout the season using various techniques. The first rivers open on the 15th of February and the season closes on all rivers by the 12th of October. Please note that some rivers in the region close for all angling on the 30th of September for conservation reasons. Currently there is no State Rod Licence required for Brown Trout or Rainbow Trout angling in Ireland. Anglers may require a Trout permit to fish certain waters which can be purchased locally. You will invariably see the signs indicating this on the river bank and also the location of the permit outlet. The majority of waters offer tourist angling permits. Once again should you require clarification please contact the local IFI Macroom or fishing tackle shop.

SEA TROUT

A State Rod Licence is required to fish for Sea Trout and angling permits are required on most Sea Trout fisheries. The Sea Trout season is pretty much the same as the Salmon season but check locally to see if Local Byelaws apply.

RAINBOW TROUT


Inland Fisheries Ireland operates a number of Rainbow Trout Fisheries in Cork and Kerry and these offer a great day out for families and friends. They are marked up on Map No.1 (Pages 40/41) in orange circles. Adult and juvenile permits are available. Please note that some of these fisheries are open all year round, also some may dose periodically for environmental reasons (check locally). Permits are charged at a nominal rate on all Rainbow Trout Lakes. Rules and regulations regarding these fisheries are printed on each permit.



BROWN TROUT

As all anglers know there are many different types of flyfishing for Brown Trout and generally all methods yield success. The regions Brown Trout are free rising and wild and offer excellent sport. They tend to be a little bigger in County Cork due to the more alkaline water and average 1lb(0.5Kg) in Cork and 1/2lb(200g) in Kerry. A 2lb(0.9Kg) plus Trout is not uncommon. The preferred method of fishing by locals is wet fly on 10ft fly rods though more and more anglers are moving down in length and line weight to add excitement. Dry fly fishing is also extremely popular. Nymphing is gaining in popularity and certainly adds another dimension. Regarding flies, well as they say "match the hatch" and you will have success. There is no shortage of flies available in the local shops. You should use size 16 to 18 for dry fly and size 12 to 14 for wet fly fishing. While barbless hooks are not mandatory we would like to suggest that you squeeze the barb down.

SEA TROUT

Lake fishing for Sea Trout during the day is very similar to lake fishing for Brown Trout and local information is essential for success. River fishing for Sea Trout is a specialised art form and certain rules must be followed to be successful. As a general rule most river fishing is done at night. Do not start fishing until it is dark as it is easy to spook the fish and put them down straight away. Wait until you hear them splashing before you enter the river and always enter the pool quietly.

You should be comfortable

- With your equipment (rods and lines for casting, know instinctively where all your accessories are and wear adequate warm clothing).
- 2) With the river (so that you know the terrain exactly and can wade confidently and are ready to beach or net the fish easily).
- 3) Mentally (so that you can concentrate 100% on the fishing and not be concerned about noises in the night there is often a lot of wildlife activity).

Keep everything simple. Use a single fly and a short leader as trying to sort out tackle problems at night can be difficult. A 10ft fly rod is ideal and regarding flies you will have no trouble purchasing them locally though the 'butcher' is very effective.

RAINBOW TROUT

Rainbow Trout Fishing is available on small lakes around the region so fish can be targeted with relative ease. It is advisable when fly fishing for this exciting species to bring a variety of fly lines with you as Rainbow Trout feed at varying depths in the water column during the day. Anglers can also use worms and spinners when fishing these lakes. All other baits are forbidden. See Game Map No.23 (Pages 56 / 57).




COARSE ANGLING OVERVIEW


INTRODUCTION

The most productive times for coarse angling are from May to November. Currently there is no State Rod Licence for coarse angling. The principle coarse fish species found in Ireland are Pike, Bream, Rudd, Roach, Eel, Carp and Tench. Bream, Rudd and Roach will regularly hybridise to give a fabulous fighting fish. Coarse angling in the South West of Ireland is centred on the River Lee system of reservoirs and anglers are required to buy a permit to fish on the central sections (Inniscarra and Carrigadrohid reservoirs). Permit fees are very affordable and all revenue is reinvested in the fishery for the benefit of anglers. Inniscarra is host to a number of international coarse angling competitions. The area offers excellent Bream, Rudd, Bream-Rudd hybrids, Roach, Perch, Carp and Pike. Lough Allua is an excellent Pike Fishery. Curraghalickey Lake is also a Premier Coarse Fishery and offers the coarse angler excellent fishing for Bream, Rudd, Hybrids and Pike.

The Coarse Angling Maps No's. 2. 3. & 4. (on Pages 42 /43) highlight a number of the more popular locations however we urge you to explore this vast area as much of it is rarely fished in any one year. No State Rod Licence is required for coarse angling but please note that there are catch limit regulations applying to the catching of coarse fish. Details can be obtained from IFI Macroom or from local tackle shops. Shreelane Lake is a big Pike, permit only, Winter fishery near Skibereen, Co. Cork. See also back of this guide.

COARSE FISH TACKLE & TECHNIQUES

Coarse angling equipment is a matter of choice and as most Coarse anglers bring all their own equipment this affords them the opportunity to experiment. Irish Coarse fish respond well to all international techniques from swimfeeder to pole fishing and all methods of float fishing.


Coarse fishing in the South West is mainly on stillwaters that include large loughs, reservoirs, small lakes and ponds. Most of these venues are clear water lakes and night fishing can be very productive. Fish respond well to groundbaiting.

Float fishing

This is a method of presenting a bait to a particular fish or a fishing area using a float attached to the baited end of the anglers tackle.


On the drop

This method explained in the diagram below is used for targeting Rudd, Roach, Dace and Skimmer Bream. Fish will take the bait anywhere from Position 1 to Position 3. Indication of a bite will be the float sliding deeper in the water or disappearing completely under the surface.



The Float Lift Method

This method is used primarily for targeting Tench and Bream which are rising in the surface column. This method is demonstrated in the diagram below.




Ledgering

This method of presenting a bait to fish involves the use of weights of various sizes to keep the bait hard on the bottom in a particular area. This again targets the bottom feeders such as Tench, Carp and Bream. Indication of a bite will be with the use of alarms, swing tips or quiver tips. The diagram on Page 24 demonstrates Ledgering techniques.

Groundbaiting

This is literally the bombardment of an area with bait to attract and hold fish for a period of time. It is essential if the angler wants good quality fishing. Many tourist anglers avail of a prebaiting service provided by guides to prebait areas of lakes prior to the angler arriving so as to ensure good fishing.







PIKE

The standard methods of deadbaiting and spinning are popular in the South West. It is illegal to use livebait when fishing for Pike or any species of freshwater fish in Ireland. Pike are a protected species and you should read the information noticeboards at the fishing sites and on our website IFI Macroom. Fly fishing for Pike using an 8/9 weight rod with a floating line and a wire leader can also be fantastic sport. The bigger the fly you can use the better. You might also try popper flies (surface flies) which splash on the surface as they are retrieved. Watching a take with this method is a truly exhilarating experience.

Pike Angling Tackle

Pike are a voracious predator when actively on the feed and can be caught quite readily by an equally active angler. They will take any Spinner, Wobbler, Plug or Spoon when they are hungry. When proving difficult to catch they can be induced onto the feed by the use of deadbaits such as Smelt, Rudd, Mackerel, Trout and Herring. These deadbaits may be fished stationary underneath a float or may be spun like a spinner which gives the advantage of smell and movement to attract the fish. The diagrams below demonstrate these methods.



INTRODUCTION

The South West coastline varies from magnificent sweeping bays and rugged inlets to wide estuaries and sandy beaches. The five huge headlands that jut out into the deep Atlantic Ocean are bathed in the warm North Atliantic Drift ensuring a wide variety of species. Well over 50 species of sea fish are on offer to the angler and the more common are presented on Pages 29 - 32. Exotic species such as Gilthead Bream and Trigger Fish can also be caught. Currently there is no State Rod Licence or permit fees required for Sea angling. There is no closed season for Sea Angling in the region other than restrictions on Bass fishing which includes a closed season from the 15th May to the 15th June when all Bass must be returned alive. There is also a daily bag limit of two Bass per person and all Bass under 40cm must be returned alive.

SHORE ANGLING

The South West is renowned as a classic shore angling destination. With its sandy beaches and rocky coastline all the Sea angling disciplines are catered for. The accompanying Sea Maps - No's.(1 - 9) (Pages 58 - 66) offer clear and precise information on the more popular spots but once again if you require additional information please contact us. When shore angling please observe recognised safety precautions paying particular attention to tides and wave height. When here you should also try fly fishing for Bass, Pollock and Mackerel which is great sport on light tackle. Angling guides are available in most areas and their knowledge is invaluable.

CHARTER BOAT ANGLING

Charter boat angling is readily available and well organized in the South West and offers an exciting day out for all ages. Boat prices range from €300 to €500 per day or about €50 Euro per person per day. Over half of the nations charter boat fleet is situated in the Cork and Kerry region so there is plenty of choice. Please use only registered charter vessels as these adhere to current safety regulations. All skippers are very knowledgeable and usually have the latest fish finding technology on board. Travelling to the fishing marks can also be rewarding as you may see some of the many ancient settlements scattered around our coast and islands. You may also see different species of sea bird, marine mammal and cetacean.

SMALL BOAT ANGLING

During the past twenty years more and more anglers who have come to Ireland have towed their inshore boats with them. Today this type of inshore angling is extremely popular especially as the region abounds with many small slipways that are ideal for launching such craft. We would be happy to assist you in planning your trip or selecting an area.

EXOTIC ANGLING SPECIES IN THE SOUTH WEST




Attractor Spoon Hook Size 4-1/0

Baited Spoon Rig

This popular rig is used predominantly when fishing for bottom dwelling species such as flatfish and gurnards however it will also catch many other species.


The idea is that fish are attracted by the flashing spoon and then see the balt as they approach. It usually fishes best when the boat is drifting but will also fish well while at anchor.



This rig is very important when targeting pollack, coalfish and cod on wrecks or reefs. It is a method of fishing artificial lures at different speeds to represent escaping food items.

Lures can be Redgill / Eddystone eels, Rubber Shads or Jelly Worms. These lures are designed to work at different retrieval rates so it would be important to vary the retrieve from slow to fast to find the optimum speed.


BOAT RIGS



Three Hook Paternoster Rig

This is one of the most versatile rigs available to the boat angler as it covers both the bottom dwelling species as well as those that live and hunt off the bottom.

It also allows a variety of baits to be used at the one time and its attractiveness can be enhanced by adding small lures to the hooks. It works equally well on the drift or at anchor.



The Leger Rig

This rig and the many variations of it is used usually when targeting a particular species as it can focus its one hook and one bait by varying the size of hook, bait or snood according to the species being sought. It also concentrates its focus on bottom dwelling species.


Particularly useful when wreck fishing as one hook has less tendency to get caught in the wreck than three hooks. Good for targeting tope, skate, and conger eels.

Long Range Wishbone Rig

This is a useful rig when fishing at distance from the shore. This rig allows the angler to fish two baits in the fishing zone and also two varieties of bait which can help when targeting multiple species. It can be particularly deadly when fishing for flatfish such as plaice, dabs and flounder from beaches.




The Pulley Rig

This is an excellent rig when targeting fish living in rough kelp ridden grounds.

The rig is designed to lift the lead weight free of snags when hooked into a fish. This would be used frequently when targeting wrasse, bull huss and rays.




The Bomber Rig

This is an excellent rig when targeting fish at distance and also in a strong run of tide. It is not suitable for fishing in the surf as it tends to tangle as a result of the wave action.

A leger rig to give a Two-Up/One-Down rig which is a catching rig for any occasion. This rig enables the angler to fish at distance while still protecting the bait from flying off the hook during powerful casts by keeping it attached to the rig body. Upon entering the water the bait snoods unclip and fish freely. A variation of this rig can have three hooks

ETIQUETTE & SAFETY

ANGLERS COUNTRY CODE

- · Enjoy the countryside and respect its life and work
- · Guard against all risk of fire
- · Fasten all gates
- Keep your dogs under close control
- Use gates and stiles to cross fences, hedges and walls
- · Leave livestock, crops and machinery alone
- · Take your litter home
- · Help to keep all water clean
- · Protect wildlife, plants and trees
- · Take special care on country roads
- Make no unnecessary noise
- Enjoy yourself

FLY FISHING ETIQUETTE

- · Know the local fishing regulations
- Fish barbless hooks fish prefer these
- Be considerate of others
- If you spot someone on or near a section of water, that section is theirs until they move on.
- · When passing another angler do it with common sense
- · Handle all fish with care

BAIT GATHERERS CODE

- · Gather only what you need to ensure future supplies of bait.
- · Back fill all holes, for safety, and to maintain the inter-tidal harbour.
- · Replace all turned rocks and stones as this will preserve the food chain.
- · Do not dig around moorings, slipways, sea walls etc.
- Be aware of local hazards and conditions, I.E. soft mud, quicksand, tidal flows, fog and adverse weather conditions.
- · Do not disturb nesting birds.
- · Take your litter home.
- · Tell someone where you intend to dig.

Catch and Release Guidelines for all species

These simple guidelines will give all species of fish a greater chance of survival. A fish is too valuable to be caught and enjoyed only once, be responsible.

- Use barbless hooks or pinch the barb flat with pliers. If you use a net, use one
 made of cotton mesh or rubber. It is less harmful to fish scales, gills and eyes.
 Only net your fish if it is the only way to control it.
- Wet your hands when handling fish. Dry hands and gloves will remove its protective mucous (slime) coating and scales. These protective layers help prevent infection by waterborne disease. Do not beach a fish or let it flop around the deck of the boat.
- Try not to remove the fish from the water. If you must, be quick and gentle, do
 not squeeze the fish. Do not hold the fish near the gills or eyes. Needle nose pliers,
 hemostats, de-hookers etc., will speed up the removal of a deep set hook.
- To revive the fish, hold it under the belly and by the tail, keep it in an upright
 position underwater, do not move the fish back and forth* (this is also a good
 time to get a measurement and take a photo). If you are fishing in a river or stream,
 hold the fish facing the current. Be patient and give the fish as much time as it
 needs to recover and swim away on its own.

The most important survival factors are:

- Line test Always use the heaviest line possible for each species of fish.
 Again: the longer you fight a fish, the more lactic acid is built up, the more exhausted it becomes, the greater the chance it will not survive. This is particularly true when fishing large saltwater species.
- Hook Location It would be ideal if all fish were hooked in either the upper or lower lip, unfortunately, this is not always the case. When fishing with small lures or bait the chance for hooking a fish deep in the gullet or in the gills is very high. Try to back the hook out the way it went in. Never pull on the line when the hook is lodged deep in the gullet. Cutting the line and returning the fish to the water as quickly as possible will give it its greatest chance for survival. The longer a fish is out of water and the more you practice your surgical techniques, the more likely that the fish will die.
- Depth When fishing depths of 30 feet or greater, you should bring a fish up slowly to the boat. This sometimes allows the fish to decompress (adjust to the change in water pressure). Pause while reeling the fish in and allow the air or gas from the fishes swim bladder to rise to the surface
- Water Temperature Playing a fish for an extended period of time in warm water increases its chance of dying. When the water temperature is high fish tire much more rapidly due to the increase of lactic acid that builds in their system. When fishing warm water get the fish to you as soon as possible, use a heavier line test than usual.



Weather Forecasts

Weather forecasts are broadcast daily on RTÉ Radio, television and at www.rte.ie. Check programme guides in the daily newspapers for times. Forecasts are also available on Aertel. Telephone weather forecasts are available from Irish Meteorological Service - Met Éireann at www.met.ie. Wind speeds for the whole day should be carefully checked before venturing out on lakes as weather conditions can vary throughout the day.
